OVERVIEW

Kriti Social Initiatives is a non-profit organization that has worked to alleviate extreme poverty and improve the lives of the urban poor in Hyderabad since 2009. We primarily work in two domains - children's education and women's empowerment.

Education: We work with affordable private and government schools towards our main aim of ensuring all children have access to education until 10th grade at minimum. We believe it is through education that children will be able to get better jobs, thus improving the livelihood of their families as well.

Women Empowerment: We believe that women having an income is paramount not just to empower themselves but key to improving the entire household. We provide job-ready skills for women by conducting skills training courses in tailoring, hand embroidery, mehndi designing and beautician services. We are also helping women get access to savings and credit products through promotion of self help groups in Hyderabad.

As a public charitable trust registered in 2009, we have a section 12A exemption from the income tax department, an 80G certification for donors to claim tax exemption on their donations and a FCRA registration that enables us to receive funds from abroad.

It has been 15 years since Kriti began its journey. As we look back on our projects and the countless lives touched along the way, a few things stand out. Our mission has always been clear: to identify pressing challenges, act with purpose, and strive to make a meaningful difference in the lives of those we serve.

For donors, impact is often measured in numbers—how many lives were reached, how funds were utilized. For us, it is about the stories behind those numbers. We take immense pride in the fact that our work has not just reached people, but transformed lives.

Over the years, our programs have grown beyond anything we imagined. What began as the passion and commitment of two people —Himani and myself—has extended into new regions and communities and making a meaningful difference in the lives of thousands.

Our women empowerment initiatives saw remarkable growth this year. Project Pehchaan, which promotes financial inclusion, now supports around 600 women in self-help groups who save monthly and build financial resilience. These savings have enabled many to start small businesses or meet critical family needs. Project Milan, our vocational skill development program, now operates in eight slum areas of Hyderabad, equipping women with tailoring and beautician skills that open doors to independence.

Our education programs also received a significant boost in donor support. Project Disha, our scholarship initiative, now supports over 500 students. One of the most touching moments this year was meeting a former beneficiary who, after completing his undergraduate studies, returned to donate to the very program that once supported him. A few of our students have now embarked on global career paths. Our computer literacy program has reached over 5,000 beneficiaries this year. Our homegrown curriculum blends current technologies with foundational skills to help students build their futures.

Our team has grown into a vibrant, talented group of men and women who share our vision. A recent trip to Bidar brought together nearly 100 people—trainers, teachers, tailoring and embroidery staff, and our core team. We are deeply grateful to each of them for carrying our mission forward and creating impact on the ground.

None of this would be possible without our donors and supporters. We are humbled by the trust they place in us. Their belief fuels our commitment and energizes us to continue our work.

PROJECT DISHA

Project Disha is a scholarship program that helps children from financially struggling families stay in school and build brighter futures. It mainly supports students in low-income private schools from Class 3 to 10, selecting children based on financial need and parents' commitment to education. For many families, this support is crucial in ensuring that their children continue learning and growing. Enrollment takes place each year between March and June.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Record-Breaking Reach: In its 14th year, Project Disha supported 510 students, the highest number of beneficiaries to date, with 53% girls and 47% boys.
- Expanding Access Across Levels: The program covered 425 school students (Grades 1–10) and 85 college students (Grades 11 & above), with 17% enrolled in higher education.
- Supporting Families in Need: Most students belong to families
 engaged in low-income occupations like daily wage labor, autodriving, and domestic work. Disha continues to ensure children
 from these households are not forced to drop out due to
 financial constraints.
- Student Successes: Alumni of the program have gone on to pursue careers in multinational corporations, healthcare, and architecture, with some now giving back to the program.
- Retention & Future Plans: Despite the high numbers, only 4
 students dropped out due to family health issues. Looking ahead,
 the program aims to increase its reach by 25% in 2025–26, with
 a projected budget of ₹1.26 crores.

PROJECT PRERANA

Project Prerana is Kriti's mentoring program for class 9 and 10 students. It brings together industry professionals with ambitious students from Kriti's scholarship program to guide career planning and life skills. Every other week, for a period of seven months, mentors met with a small group of students to discuss pertinent topics that would set our scholars up for success in the future. Topics included: communication, how to study, short-term planning, mind maps, media literacy, internet safety, citizenship, entrepreneurship, and understanding gender.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Wide Reach & Flexible Delivery: The mentorship program engaged 225 students in Grades 9 and 10 through a hybrid online-offline model, ensuring accessibility for mentors and mentees alike.
- Dedicated Volunteer Network: Approximately 50 mentors many returning from previous years—led sessions with added emphasis on personality development and social responsibility.
- **Prioritizing Emotional Wellbeing:** The curriculum integrated social-emotional learning as a core component, helping students build confidence, resilience, and ethical awareness.
- Impactful Learning Modules: Sessions on entrepreneurship and internet safety emerged as favorites among students, sparking curiosity and critical thinking on real-world challenges.
- Community Recognition: Mentors were honored at Kriti's
 Annual Day celebration for their ongoing dedication and impact on students' lives.

PROJECT KAUSHAL

Project Kaushal, launched in 2019, provides computer literacy and digital skills training to underprivileged individuals. The Kriti Kaushal Center in Brindavan Colony near Film Nagar accommodates up to 25 students per session and operates daily from 11 AM to 7 PM, with extended Sunday hours.

Courses run 2–4 months and cover Computer Basics, Advanced Basics, Microsoft Office, Robotics, Python, Scratch, Web Design, and Data Entry.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Center Operations:
 - Shaikpet Nala Center (established 4 years ago) trained
 420 learners in 2024–25; 285 completed 285 courses
 and earned certificates.
 - Addagutta Center (opened in October 2024) enrolled
 160 students during the year.
- Flexible & Inclusive Learning: Courses span 3–4 months, with learners receiving 2 hours of training per week. Centers operate from 11 AM to 7 PM and remain open on Sundays to accommodate working individuals.
- Tie Up with Nearby Private Low-Cost Student: During the day, we have connected with nearby schools and institutions who are sending their students to learn computer literacy skills.

SCHOLARSHIP TO SPOTLIGHT: SHIREEN BEGUM'S JOURNEY INTO TECH

Shireen Begum's story shows what becomes possible when talent meets opportunity. A former scholarship student, she is now pursuing her degree while working part-time building websites—a key step toward a career in technology. In 2025, she was selected as a student representative at The Circle event in Mumbai, where she shared her experiences as a young woman in tech with educators, peers, and changemakers from across India.

Her success is supported by Kriti's partnership with the Barabari Collective, which prepares students for tech and design jobs through a blended learning model. Through this initiative, Shireen has gained practical skills, mentorship, and real-world exposure—tools helping her build her future and inspire others in her community.

PROJECT PRATIBHA

Over the years, Kriti has partnered with government schools lacking computer labs, equipment, or trained teachers. Through Project Pratibha, it works to bridge this gap and promote computer literacy. In collaboration with administrators, Kriti has integrated computer classes into regular timetables, aligned with education department guidelines. The program now runs in nine government high schools—five in Shaikpet, two in Secunderabad, and two in Hyderabad. Students from grades 6–10 attend at least two classes weekly, with reduced participation for grade 10 during board prep. Project Pratibha helps underserved students build essential digital skills for the future.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Infrastructure Support: With corporate partnership, computer labs were established in 9 schools, each equipped with 15-25 computers and a projector, ensuring regular access for students through a scheduled 2 periods per week.
- Assessment & Monitoring: Termly assessments are conducted to track student progress. Trainers undergo subject and teaching skill training and capacity building, monthly reviews, and ongoing support from senior education staff.

TEACHING ANIMATION

ROBOTICS COMPETITION

As part of Project Pratibha, we strive to ensure students gain both classroom knowledge and real-world opportunities to apply their skills. We're proud that Shaikpet Government High School won the Grand Masters Accomplishment Award at the 4th Annual Robotics Exhibition hosted by Soham Academy—a testament to students' creativity, hard work, and curiosity when given the tools to explore technology and innovation.

PROJECT SHIKSHA

Project Shiksha works to improve education in government schools by placing additional teachers, upgrading infrastructure, and enhancing learning outcomes for underprivileged children. In 2024–25, across 16 schools in Shaikpet, Khairatabad, and Secunderabad mandals, Kriti deployed 29 trained teachers. Each undergoes 10+days of training in teaching methods, child psychology, and activity-based learning to support children's overall development. The program also provides notebooks, art materials, and teaching aids to ensure engaging, uninterrupted learning.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- School Coverage & Reach: In 2024–25, Project Shiksha supported 18 government schools across Hyderabad and suburban areas, including Shaikpet, Kukatpally, and Secunderabad
- **Teacher Placement:** Kriti appointed 29 teachers to work in 16 government schools, helping address critical staff shortages—particularly in high schools—following changes in government recruitment mid-year.
- Teacher Training: Each teacher received 15 days of training annually, including induction and monthly sessions on pedagogy, classroom management, lesson planning, and creative teaching methods.
- Monitoring & Mentorship: Kriti's senior education team conducted regular school visits to observe classroom practices, provide feedback, and build relationships with Headmasters. Best practices and challenges were discussed during monthly review sessions.

PROJECT MILAN

Project Milan aims to create pathways to economic independence for women, particularly those from low-income communities with limited mobility. We offer training in tailoring, embroidery, and beautician services—skills that enable women to take up home-based work, secure employment, or start their own small businesses. The courses are structured to be practical and hands-on, ensuring that participants gain both technical proficiency and the confidence to apply their skills in real-world settings. By bringing training opportunities into the community, Project Milan reduces barriers such as travel costs, safety concerns, and family restrictions—making skill development more accessible.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Tailoring training center at Nallagandla was closed in August 2024 and new center was opened in Shyamlal, Begumpet in February 2025.
- Suraram tailoring training center location was shifted in October 2025. Bhoiguda and Talabkatta tailoring training centers continued through the year.
- Beautician training center at Tolichowki was restarted in December 2024. Beautician training at Bhoiguda and Tukaramgate continued through the year.
- Mehndi design workshops for adolescent girls were conducted at four vocational centers in Tukaramgate, Suraram, Talabkatta and Nallagandla. 202 girls completed the six week course and picked up a new set of skills.
- Over 90 students from the different vocational centers participated in Kriti's Annual day event in April 2025.

FROM LEARNER TO EARNER: C. SANJANA'S PATH FORWARD

C. Sanjana, an 18-year-old from Bhoiguda, lives with her mother and younger brother. After the loss of her father, her mother became the sole earner, working as an ASHA worker with a monthly income of ₹10,000. With rising education expenses and household rent, the family struggled to make ends meet. Sanjana, determined to help, had to pause her education due to financial constraints.



She discovered Kriti's free beautician course during a mobilization drive and enrolled without hesitation. While still in training, Sanjana began practicing on friends and neighbors. Soft skills sessions at the center boosted her confidence, and with guidance from her trainers, she learned how to promote her services and set fair prices. Even before completing the course, she was taking up paid assignments.

Today, Sanjana offers beauty services from home and provides door-to-door services in her community, earning between ₹10,000 and ₹15,000 per month. With this new income, she is not only supporting her family but also planning to continue her education. Sanjana credits Kriti with helping her take the first step toward financial independence and a brighter future.

SEWING A STRONGER TOMORROW: MASRATH'S STORY OF STRENGTH AND SKILL

At 36, Masrath found herself at a difficult crossroads. A widow and mother of three, she was determined to support her family despite the many challenges she faced. Her son works in AC repair, and her youngest daughter is still in school, and the family's income was not enough to meet rising household expenses.



When Masrath heard about Kriti's free tailoring course through her neighbors, she saw an opportunity to rebuild. With a quiet determination, she enrolled in the course and began learning the fundamentals of tailoring. Over time, she developed the skills and confidence to start stitching blouses from home. Today, she charges ₹200 to ₹300 per blouse, providing quality work to women in her neighborhood. Her earnings may seem modest, but they have already made a meaningful difference in easing household expenses. She, one day, hopes to to open a dedicated tailoring shop of her own.

Masrath credits Kriti with helping her take the first step toward financial independence. Through skill-based training and community support, she has not only learned a trade but also reclaimed a sense of purpose and agency. Her story reflects the quiet resilience of so many women who, with the right tools, are stitching together new futures for themselves and their families.

PROJECT PEHCHAAN

Project Pehchaan is building a platform to bring together women home-based workers in Talabkatta, Hyderabad, through the formation of Self-Help Groups (SHGs). SHGs are small collectives where women pool their savings to create a shared fund, providing members with access to credit for personal and livelihood needs. These groups not only promote financial inclusion but also serve as spaces for leadership development and community building. For many participants, SHGs offer an opportunity for the women to step out of their homes, connect with peers, and gain confidence in managing money, taking initiative, and making decisions. Through Project Pehchaan, SHGs are helping women strengthen both their economic resilience and their voice within the community.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- **Staff Expansion:** Trained 5 women in basic bookkeeping skills and recruited them to become book keepers for the SHG groups.
- Adolescent Girl Sessions: Conducted workshops in 2 private and 3 government schools in Talabkatta, covering five key topics: menstrual hygiene, gender sensitization, life skills, SWOT analysis, and child rights and abuse.
- Domestic Violence Awareness: Partnered with My Choices
 Foundation to deliver training sessions on domestic violence prevention and response.
- **SHG Leadership Meetings:** Held bi-monthly meetings with SHG group leaders to provide updates on savings, box loans, upcoming activities, and awareness initiatives.
- TOSS Exam Support: Launched a trial batch of 5 women preparing for the 10th-grade equivalency certificate through TOSS (Telangana Open School Society).

FROM HOMEMAKER TO CHANGEMAKER: AYESHA BEGUM'S JOURNEY OF COURAGE & LEADERSHIP

What begins with a small step—like saving ₹50 a month—can lead to remarkable transformation. Ayesha Begum, from Talabkatta, Hyderabad, joined the Roshni Mahila Pehchaan Self-Help Group (SHG) with little more than hope. With consistent support from Kriti Social Initiatives and Project Pehchaan, her journey became one of growth and resilience.

She began by learning tailoring and soon built a steady source of income. With the help of a small loan, she purchased her first sewing machine, which allowed her to expand her work. Determined to grow further, Ayesha trained as a bookkeeper and began leading SHG meetings, helping other women strengthen their financial skills.

Her leadership journey took a new turn when she traveled on her first-ever flight to Delhi, representing SHG women at a national event. Today, Ayesha works as a community mentor, empowering other women to follow similar paths of growth and self-reliance. Her story is a powerful reminder: when women are given opportunities, they lead lasting change.

FROM HOMEBOUND TO HOPEFUL: BASEERA SULTANA'S PATH TO INDEPENDENCE

Baseera, originally from a village near Patna, moved to Talabkatta at 18 after her marriage. For most of her married life, she was a housewife, but when her husband couldn't afford their children's school fees, she decided to act.

Living in the same building as Kriti's first office, she learned about Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and joined Alhamdulillah—Kriti's second SHG in Talabkatta —despite her husband's disapproval. Within three months, she secured an ₹8,000 loan to cover school admissions and fees, while also offering private tuition to neighborhood children.

Her journey didn't stop there. Through Kriti, she learned tailoring and embroidery, and repaid her loans through income from Project Hunar. Later, she enrolled in the field coordinator training under Project Pehchaan. Though she was not selected the first time, she persisted—redoing the training and securing a position in April 2025. Today, Baseera is preparing for her TOSS exam and learning how to drive a two-wheeler, taking full advantage of the opportunities available through the Talabkatta Center. What began as a desperate attempt to fund her children's education has grown into a steady, determined pursuit of independence.

WOMENS DAY CELEBRATION

This year, Kriti Social Initiatives marked a milestone by hosting our first major community event in Talabkatta, Old City Hyderabad, in honor of International Women's Day. Home to over 600 women participants, the Talabkatta center has become a hub of learning, connection, and empowerment for women from the local Muslim community.

The celebration brought together over 300 women, featuring performances by center members, a mehendi competition, and inspiring addresses by Farzana Khan (My Choices Foundation) and Jai Bharathi (MOWO Social Initiatives). The event also spotlighted moving stories from our case study award winners.

More than a celebration, the day served as a powerful affirmation of community, resilience, and women's voices. It reflected Kriti's ongoing commitment to creating spaces where women are seen, heard, and supported in their journeys toward economic and social empowerment.

PROJECT HUNAR

Project Hunar connects women artisans to market opportunities, creating sustainable livelihoods in tailoring, hand embroidery, and lac bangle making. Kriti runs dedicated production units for garments, bags, and embroidery, where women receive training and produce high-quality products. These include apparel, home decor, and accessories for Kriti's Kritikala brand as well as for corporate clients and other brands. The units also produce customized jute and delegate bags for conferences and events. Through Project Hunar, women artisans gain valuable skills, steady income, and greater economic independence—empowering them to contribute meaningfully to their households and communities.

KEY ACTIVITIES

- Started hand embroidery training at Talabkatta.
- Relaunched the online store https://kritikala.org on shopify and worked with a digital marketing agency to drive traffic to the store.
- Hired a senior garment cutting master in November 2024 to enhance new designs and production at the unit. Also started a training program to upskill the tailoring trainers with advanced pattern making and stitching techniques so that they can start higher level courses at the tailoring training centers.
- Supplied bags to number of large events and conferences including the Society of Woman Engineers conference, Hyderabad Literary Festival, Goethe Zentrum, University of Hyderabad and others.


